GENERAL & LIVESTOCK RULES & REGULATIONS

- All Exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Stoneboro Fair.
- 2. The Fair Management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules & regulations as its judgment may determine.
- Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage but the Fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, theft or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
- Entries will be made according to classification.
- 5. Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. The same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The Judges may, at their discretion, award a ribbon or rosette.

The Fair reserves the RIGHT TO DETERMINE how many entries they will accept from an Exhibitor in the same class or, in the case of livestock, the same breed, and poultry, the same species.

THE DECISION OF THE JUDGES SHALL BE FINAL IN ALL CASES except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion — not discovered at the time of the award - are proven. In such cases, the Superintendent, President, or Secretary of the Fair, or such referee as he/she may appoint, may make the decision. The case may be appealed to the Fair Management from whose decision there can be no appeal.

All protests regarding judging must be made in writing and must plainly state the cause of the complaint or appeal. Such protests must be filed at the Fair Office within 24 hours of the occurrence.

6. It shall be the responsibility of the Exhibitor TO NAME PROPERLY THE ARTICLE OR BREED OF LIVESTOCK he/she is entering. Any exhibit improperly entered will be disqualified to receive a prize, but the Judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag so the same mistake in entering will not be made the second time.

Every exhibit accepted for premiums must be given an entry tag which must be plainly marked. In cases of livestock, the breed name must be shown and in the case of poultry the species must be shown on cards that can be identified by viewers. Cards will be available at the Secretary's Office; the Exhibitor is responsible for securing, printing, and hanging cards. The award winners must be placed for show. Failure to comply with this regulation will result in forfeiture of premiums.

- All entries must have been grown, produced, or made since the last Fair by the person whose name appears on the tag as Exhibitor.
- 8. Superintendents reserve the right to refuse any entry or bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, products, and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.

(The Superintendent must notify Exhibitors of any exhibits that have wilted or become unfit. After having done this, the Superintendent may dispose of the exhibit.)

9. The Fair Management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of exhibit in bad condition, and any article unfit to show may

be excluded. Food products cannot be polluted with any substances or chemicals that causes them to become poisonous and unfit to be used as food.

NO EXHIBIT MAY BE REMOVED AT ANY TIME BEFORE THE CLOSE OF THE FAIR EXCEPT BY CONSENT OF THE MANAGEMENT.

- 10. The Superintendents and/or Show Committee have the authority to require the animals to be shown to be inspected by the Judge.
- 11. During the judging, buildings (except livestock arenas) are to be closed to everyone except Fair Officials, Judges, and necessary attendants.

DÉPARTMENT SUPERINTENDENTS MAY ENTER EXHIBITS IN THEIR OWN DEPARTMENTS, but neither they nor any other Exhibitor may communicate with the Judges during the time of determining the awards, except to answer questions proposed by Judges.

Any Exhibitor interfering with the Judges while making awards shall forfeit any premium for which she/he would otherwise have been entitled.

- 12. All livestock offered for premiums must have been the property of the owner for thirty (30) days or longer. (Livestock or poultry entered under a name other than the owner's shall be disqualified for premiums.)
- 13. No person shall be allowed in the ring while stock is being judged, except the Judge, Superintendents, necessary attendants, and Fair officials.
- 14. Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes shall move into the next higher position if, in the opinion of the Judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.
- 15. Overfitting of cattle will be discriminated against. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of the animal will disqualify the animal from competition.
- 16. When on exhibit in the ring, each animal must be under halter and under the control of the owner or the employee.
- 17. Joint ownership is considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.
- 18. 4-H and F.F.A. livestock entries are limited to Mercer County residents only. An exception will be made in allowing out-of-county youth to exhibit in the 4-H showmanship.

An exception will be made in allowing out-of-county youth exhibiting Polled Hereford animals to compete in 4-H and F.F.A. as members of the Northwestern PA Polled Hereford Association.

An exception will be made in allowing Venango County youth exhibiting draft horses to compete in 4-H and F.F.A. as members of the Venango County Draft Horse Association.

- 19. No Exhibitor may receive more than two monetary awards in each class.
- 20. Wednesday, August 30th, will be devoted to the reception and arrangement of articles for exhibition. All articles entered for premiums must be placed in the hands of the Superintendent no later than Wednesday, August 28th, by 9:00 PM. Fine Arts & Rabbit exhibits must be in place by 8 PM on Tuesday, August 27th 2024.
- 21. The Fair will provide a central sound system. Other sound equipment will not be allowed on the grounds without permission
- 22. Vehicles and trailers can be parked in the barn area only for loading and unloading; then they must be moved promptly to designated areas.

- 23. All persons shall leave the Fairgrounds by midnight or within 30 minutes after the close of the last show for the day, whichever occurs later, except those persons assisting with the Fair or with exhibits or displays.
- 24. All campers on the Fairgrounds must be registered at the Fair Office upon entry to the Fairgrounds. Occupants must register at the office and pay a fee of \$75.00 plus \$12 for each air conditioner, Tent \$40.00. ALL CAMPERS WILL BE PARKED IN DESIGNATED AREAS. No campers admitted before 10 AM on Sunday August 25th, 2024, EXHIBITORS ONLY. An application form is included in each premium book.
- 25. The Fair and its officers or agents will not be responsible for any accident, loss, theft, or damage to persons, animals, vehicles or personal property which may occur.
- 26. Persons using alcohol or other controlled drugs or substances or engaged in disorderly behavior will be expelled from the grounds.
- 27. All delivery people and suppliers are requested to be off the midways by 11:00 AM each day of the Fair, and 10:00 AM on Labor Day
- 28. Buildings will be open from Thursday after judging has been completed, Friday thru Sunday 10:00 AM to 10:00 PM, Monday 9:00 AM to 10:00 PM.
- NO PETS, leashed or unleashed, (except for Service Animals) will be permitted on the Fairgrounds.
- 30. Anyone found on Fair property after midnight without a wristband or proof of admittance will be escorted off the grounds.
- 31. An Exhibitor of items not requiring an entry fee must enter 10 items in order to be eligible to purchase two Exhibitor Wristbands.
- 32. All animal exhibitors are eligible for two free exhibitor wristbands. They are eligible to purchase up to 10 additional exhibitor wristbands.

ADVICE TO LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

- The deadline for entries is August 07, 2024. All Exhibitors must make advance entries. Please mail entry forms to The Great Stoneboro Fair, P.O. Box 215, Stoneboro, PA 16153.
- All entries must be on forms provided by the Stoneboro Fair. Entry forms can be obtained by writing to Patty Adamson, Secretary, @ P.O. Box 215, Stoneboro, PA 16153 or Phone 724-376-2852 or downloaded from the Great Stoneboro Fair website www.stoneborofair.info.
- 3. There is to be only ONE entry number per person; be sure you show your number when showing.
- 4. Upon your arrival with stock, the Superintendent of the Department where you are an Exhibitor will assign the stalls your stock will occupy. DO NOT take space unless it is assigned to you. DO NOT ALTER ANY STALLS WITHOUT THE APPROVAL OF THE SUPERINTENDENT.
- 5. If you need any information about the Department, go to the Superintendent. The Superintendents will be found at or near their respective Departments and will assist you.
- Superintendents in charge of Departments have the right to prescribe dimensions and regulate positions of all signs and direct the arrangement of articles to secure harmony and make an attractive appearance.
- 7. DO NOT lock your stables and leave the immediate area. Visitors pay to see your stock, and you are expected to show it.
- 8. All Exhibitors are to display a farm or owner's sign to identify their breed or breeds of dairy and livestock and must fill out a stall card to identify each exhibit. Exhibitors are responsible for posting these cards. This is required by the Department of Agriculture.
- Labor Day is always crowded; however, livestock and dairy animals may be removed from the grounds after 7:00 PM on the last day of the Fair. Other exhibits may be removed at 8:00 PM.
- ALL CAMPERS AND RECRÉATIONAL VEHICLES MUST BE PARKED IN DESIGNATED AREAS.
- 11. Absolutely NO raffles or games of chance are permitted in the barns.

HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS

All animals admitted to the Fair shall be identified by a unique and permanent ear tag, tattoo, brand, or records of unique physical attributes. Animals known to be infected with or exposed to any contagious, infectious, or external parasitic disease, and animals restricted by quarantine may not be presented for show purposes.

All animals admitted to the Fair must comply with applicable state (7PA Code) or federal (9CFR) rules.

Animals presented for exhibition will be subject to inspection by show officials and will be rejected if evidence of infectious, contagious, or parasitic disease is apparent or if health certification or identification documentation is not acceptable.

The Great Stoneboro Fair

All show animals should be held in isolation for at least 30 days after return to the herd of origin.

GUIDELINES FOR CARE OF ANIMALS

It is the responsibility of each Exhibitor to care for animals in a manner that is responsible and ethical. Following are some guidelines for the treatment of animals exhibited at the show.

- 1. Restraining Animals
 - a. Animals should be tied or penned in a manner that will not hurt the animal or restrict its breathing in any way.
 - b. Animals should be tied so that all four feet are firmly on the ground and they have enough room to stand comfortably and lie down.
 - c. Animals should be tied so that they are not able to injure animals tied near them.
 - d. Animals unaccustomed to each other should not be penned together.
- Handling Any type of rough handling which could harm the animal is prohibited. The use
 of whips, canes and show sticks should be restricted to showing only and then be used
 only to guide the animals, not punish them. Remember, animals will respond quicker and
 better to guiet, gentle handling, rather than loud, rough handling.
- Bedding All animals should have bedding that is dry and clean. Pens should be cleaned regularly to keep the animals clean and comfortable. If non-traditional bedding such as carpeting is used, it should be regularly cleaned (at least twice daily) to keep the pen free from manure.
- 4. Feeding & Water Animals should be well-fed and have access to clean water regularly. Realizing that many market animals must have restricted amounts of feed to maintain the proper weight, animals must be fed adequate amounts of feed to meet the animal's basic requirements. Animals not allowed reasonable access to feed and water will be disqualified from the show.
- Transportation Animals should be transported in a way that is both safe and considerate
 of the animal's well-being.
- Blanket/Sweat Collars Any type of material such as blankets or sweat collars should be large enough to permit normal body functions such as breathing, eating, drinking, or lying down.
- 7. Health It is the responsibility of the Exhibitors to provide proper health care for their animals through routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals. The improper or illegal use of drugs or antibiotics is prohibited. If medication is indicated, be sure to follow the label directions and allow more than the stated withdrawal time.

BIOSECURITY CHECKLIST FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

No visitors from a country that has animals infected with Foot and Mouth Disease have visited my farm within the previous 30 days.

Certificates of veterinary inspection are current for all of the animals I will be taking to the Fair. All equipment, such as buckets, pitchforks, shovels, rakes, wheelbarrows, manure baskets, lead ropes, halters, nose rings, snares, clippers, scissors, brushes, etc., has been cleaned and disinfected before entering the fairgrounds. (A solution of household bleach in water is recommended for disinfection purposes: add 2 gallons of bleach to 3 gallons of water for disinfecting equipment.)

- ☐ I have received a list of the recommended biosecurity precautions that I should follow after returning to the farm with the animals that were taken to the Fair.
- ☐ Any livestock showing signs of illness, including signs that suggest infection with Foot and Mouth Disease, will be reported immediately to the Livestock Superintendent of the Fair.
- ☐ Any questions about disease and biosecurity measures can be directed to the regional veterinarian or animal inspector, who will be visiting the Fairgrounds for daily inspections.

Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture regional veterinarians will be visiting each fair in Pennsylvania this season on a daily basis. They will be available to answer questions from Exhibitors and will be doing general inspections of the animals and animal facilities.

NOTICE ONE WAY TRAFFIC

Entry Day, August 28th, the road from the Main Gate (by the horse barns) to Gate #4 (Stoneboro Gate) will be One-Way Traffic. All Traffic using this road must enter at the Main Gate and Leave at Gate #4.

Labor Day, September 2nd, after 7:00 PM, all traffic using this road must enter at the Main Gate and Leave at Gate #4.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS RULES AND REGULATIONS

- Check-In is Tuesday, August 27, 2024, from 6-9 PM. All equine animals must come through the main gate. No animal will be unloaded until the veterinarian or Superintendent has given the approval upon verifying the required paperwork. All animals are to remain on the premises until September 2, 2024, at 7:00 PM unless released by the Superintendent.
- The Fair reserves the right to refuse any or all entries, and the right to order any Exhibitor to remove stock for failure to follow rules of the Department.
- 3. All animals entered must be shown in at least ONE HALTER CLASS and stabled on the grounds and must have met all health requirements.
- 4. Exhibitors must keep stalls and space they occupy in a clean and sanitary condition and must remove equipment promptly as the Superintendent may direct.
- 5. Stalls will be awarded based on registration date. There will NOT be a choice of stalls. Moving of stall tags by an Exhibitor may result in expulsion of Exhibitor without refund of entry fees.
- 6. Stall guards will be required on all stalls for the safety of horses and attendees.
- 7. If you wish to repair, rebuild, paint, or otherwise improve the condition of your stall, you must first have approval of the Superintendent and Director of Maintenance.
- 8. Exhibitors must post stall cards.
- No grade stallions--exception stallion foals. No one UNDER 18 years of age is to handle a stallion.
- 10. Horses may be purebred or grade but must be shown in the appropriate class.
- 11. Equine animals are NOT permitted to enter the midway area at any time and must stay off the racetrack. All horses must be led to the exercise area. Horses may not be exercised outside of the arena.
- 12. The order of show will not necessarily correspond to the order of classes appearing in the premium book.
- 13. No class changes may be made after entry day. NOTE: The same entry number can NOT be in the same class/nor show ring at the same time. NO EXCEPTIONS! ALSO: the same horse can NOT be shown in the same class by two different people. NO **EXCEPTIONS!!!**
- 14. The Judge's decision is final on ALL shows including 5 minute time limit on gate call.15. If the number of entries does not warrant all listed classes, classes may be combined, (except champion classes).
- 16. All 4-H and FFA members' animals must be entered and shown in the 4-H and FFA members' names. All 4-H and FFA youth will stay in the ring at the close of the class for awards.
- 17. Youth drivers must be accompanied by an adult for safety reasons. All youths 10 years of age and under handling equine animals must be accompanied by an adult at all times outside of the show ring.
- 18. All youths (18 and under) must wear an approved helmet, long pants, and hard-soled shoes.
- 19. Adults must wear hard-soled shoes; no bare feet or open shoes will be permitted. Adults are permitted to help with handlers who are younger than eight years of age.

20. The Judge or Show Management shall have the authority to dismiss any entry from the ring if the entry is not under sufficient control.

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HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR CATTLE

Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD)

Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) is an extremely contagious viral disease that affects cloven-hooved animals, especially domestic cattle, pigs, sheep, and goats. FMD is rarely fatal to infected adult animals, but causes pain and suffering to those animals, which leads to a severe drop in production. The disease can be devastating to the economy of an infected state and country.

The first signs of FMD in animals which are usually noticed:

Lameness

Decreased feed intake

Both are a result of pain from the blisters and sores caused by the virus.

Infection with FMD causes:

Blisters, Fever, Excessive Salivation, Abortions, Decreased Milk Production, Weight Loss

Disinfection

The virus that causes FMD can be inactivated by several disinfectants, including household bleach. It can be killed by extremes in PH (below ph6 and above ph1) by sunlight, and high temperatures, although the virus has been shown to survive single pasteurization at 161.6 degrees F (15 seconds). It can survive in the environment at freezing temperatures: It can survive in the soil for almost a month in cool weather; about three days during the sunny, summer months. It may even live in stored hay for up to four to five months in cool, dry conditions.

Transmission of Foot and Mouth Disease

Although Foot and Mouth Disease does not pose a serious risk to human health, humans can act as vectors for the virus and can spread infection among animals or between farms. Methods of transmission of FMD include:

Droplets: Direct contact with clinically ill, recovered (carrier) animals, or exposed vaccinated animals: Virus particles can be found in body fluids, including urine, feces, saliva, semen, and milk, and also in exhaled breath.

People: The FMD virus can survive in the lungs and nasal passages of humans for several days, and in the tonsils for several weeks. Virus particles are released and can infect susceptible animals when the person exhales.

Clothing: Virus particles can survive on contaminated clothing (the FMD virus can survive for several weeks on clothes and shoes, especially if these articles are dirty).

Other animals: Movement of pets or other animals through an infected area can spread the virus.

Food Products: Contaminated meat and cheese products can spread the virus.

Air: Airborne virus particles might be carried in air currents for up to 40 miles.

- Exhibitors will be expected to display or parade their animals as directed by the Superintendent: (a) to accept the stall assigned without controversy, (b) to keep their animals in an attractive appearance, and (c) to cooperate with the Department in every way that may serve to increase the educational value of the show.
- 2. It is the responsibility of the Exhibitors of livestock to know when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the ring promptly on call, and a failure to comply with the order renders Exhibitors liable to be ruled out of competing. Decorations with ribbons or ornaments previously won by animals at shows will be prohibited until after the awards have been made in their respective classes by the Judge.
- Exhibitors must have all animals listed for competition on the grounds not later than August 28 @ 5:00 PM. All such animals are to remain on the premises until Labor Day, 7:00 PM, unless released by the Superintendent.
- The Exhibitors will be expected to keep the space they occupy in a clean and sanitary condition and to remove all their equipment promptly as the Superintendent may direct.
- 5. Dairy Cattle will be shown on Friday, beginning at 8:30 am in the following order: Jersey, Holstein, Guernsey, Milking Shorthorn, Brown Swiss, Ayrshire. Each breed will start with Bull Calf class. All Bull classes in that breed will be shown and then will start with spring calf of that breed and then the entire breed will be shown before moving on to the next breed. At the conclusion of ALL breeds showing the Champions from each breed will compete for Supreme Cow and Supreme Jr of the Show.
- All 4-H and Open class animals will remain in the ring after each open class is judged for the awarding of prizes in the area of YOUTH CONTESTS. All animals must be entered in the Exhibitor's name and be shown by a 4-H YOUTH.
- Exhibitors must fill out and display stall cards for each animal. Secure cards from the Secretary at the time of checking entries. Cards must be displayed prior to showing.
- 8. Have registration papers with you. Some classes will be spot-checked.
- 9. All 4-H Showmanship will be held on Friday after the type classes are concluded. Participants do NOT have to wear whites; however appropriate attire preferably jeans and Fair t-shirt and boots or appropriate footwear are required. If 4-H premiums are being collected it is mandatory for 4-H Exhibitors to show in showmanship competition directly after the type show on Friday. Exception may only be made by the Dairy Superintendent prior to the show. Exhibitors will be given the opportunity to make any changes or corrections to their entries on Thursday evening from 6-8 pm at the milking parlor. Minimal changes will be made during the show.

MILKING CENTER REGULATIONS

The facilities and equipment at the "Milking Center" are provided for the exclusive use of the Exhibitors of milking dairy cows and are to be used for milking ONLY. There shall be NO clipping or washing of cattle or any other livestock, other than udder washing as a preparation for milking. The Milking Center washing equipment and water shall not be used for any other purpose. No milk from animals being treated with antibiotics shall be introduced into the milking system.

The Great Stoneboro Fair

Any person entering a milking cow at the Fair, by his/her entry, gives the Dairy Superintendent or designee the authorization to sample milk from that cow periodically for the purpose of antibiotic testing.

All milk from the milking center will be sold to a milk handler selected by the Dairy Superintendent with payment made to dairy cattle Exhibitors.

The milking center will be open for use between the hours of 7:00 AM to 9:00 AM, and 7:00 PM to 9:00 PM each day of the Fair with the exception of the evening prior to the show and show day when off-hour milking is necessary for show preparation.

The Dairy Parlor Superintendent shall establish additional rules as he/she may deem necessary and such rules will be posted at the Milking Center.

To ensure a cage reservation, entries MUST be in by August 7, 2024. Sawdust will be furnished by the Fair Association. Feed to be furnished by the Fair Association, donated by McCartney's Feed Mill, Fredonia, PA, Sandy Lake Mills, Sandy Lake, PA, and Tractor Supply, Greenville, PA.

Since all birds returned from the show are potential sources of infection to other birds, they should be isolated immediately after their return, separate and apart from other birds. This isolation should be maintained indefinitely, if possible, or at least until it has been established that the birds are not carriers of disease producing agents. This may be determined by exposure of a few susceptible birds in direct contact with them.

NOTE: Health certificate forms may be secured from the Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Animal Industry. All birds entered for exhibition shall be free of external parasites (lice, mites, etc.).

* Avian Flu might necessitate cancellation of Poultry Exhibit.
RULES

- 1. There will be **\$.50** entry fee on each entry and must accompany the entry blank.
- Exhibits shall be open to Crawford, Mercer, Butler, Lawrence, and Venango counties. Then if space permits, additional entries from other counties will be accepted on a "first-come-first-serve basis." When cooping capacity has been reached, the remaining entries will be returned. Entries are limited to 75 birds per family in Mercer County, and other counties 50 birds per family.
- All birds being judged for prize money must be pure breed, with the exception of Capons.
- 4. All poultry must be owned by Exhibitor for a minimum of 30 days prior to the Fair.
- A class will be provided for all breeds of Chickens, Bantams, Ducks, Geese, and Guinea Fowl as shown on the breed classification list.
- Birds will be judged according to the American Standard of Perfection and due consideration will be given to the utility qualities, especially to those varieties that are generally used for commercial purposes.
- 7. The cage capacity for the Poultry Department is 500 entries.
- 8. Any bird entered in incorrect class will be disqualified.
- 9. Entries limited to 2 birds in each class per Exhibitor.
- 10. All 4-H members entering poultry must follow all rules and can receive 4-H and open premiums.

RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING VEGETABLES

- In selecting vegetables for exhibition, choose such specimens that would bring the highest market price. Do not select the largest; select medium size specimens. If at all possible, do not mix varieties.
- 2. The following factors are generally used by an expert vegetable judge:
 - Trueness to variety type. If at all possible, pick the specimens from one variety.
 - b. Uniformity in size, shape and color.
 - Be sure to pick out the perfect specimen, then select the other as similar to it as possible. Never mix specimens of different maturity.
 - d. Protect from dirt, disease, infection, and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.
 - e. Condition and maturity. Be sure that exhibits are of high quality.
 - f. Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil using a soft cloth or brush.
 - g. Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc. should have tops (leaves) removed leaving about two inches of stems.

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ANIMAL EXHIBITION, INCLUDING COMMERCIAL EXHIBITION

SUBCHAPTER A: GENERAL INFORMATION SECTION

1. **Background:** This document provides the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture's (Department) animal health requirements and recommendations for all animal exhibitions (shows) in the Commonwealth, including Pennsylvania county and community fairs. This document is divided into Requirements and Recommendations for both Pennsylvania animals and animals arriving from out of state for each species. The Requirements listed in this document are mandated by law. The legal basis for these recommendations can be found at the end of the document in Subchapter D. Recommendations are not legally mandated but are based on best practices and the scientific judgement of the state animal health officials. Fairs are strongly encouraged to adopt these recommendations. Fairs may impose more stringent rules than the requirements in this document at their own discretion. All exhibitors are encouraged to check with the management of each fair in advance to ensure compliance with all fair requirements. While this document is designed for organizations receiving funding through the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act (act of July 8, 1986, P.L. 437, No. 92)(3 P.S. §§

1501- 1510), this document serves as a reference for all animal exhibits as defined in the Animal Exhibition Sanitation Act (3 Pa.C.S. §§ 2501-2504). These requirements and recommendations are a shared responsibility of show management and exhibitors to protect public and animal health in the Commonwealth.

2. Important information regarding poultry exhibition cancellations: Due to Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) detections in the Commonwealth, a signed General Quarantine order went into effect on April 16th, 2022. The order, titled 52 Pa. B 2223 General Quarantine Order; Cancellation of Exhibition of Poultry and Their Hatching Eggs Due to Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza, prohibits the display, exhibit, or presence of poultry, poultry products, including eggs, poultry parts or any goods or items containing or made up of poultry products such as feathers, or poultry parts at any exhibitions or other such venues within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania which receive funding pursuant to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act 3 P.S. § 1501 et seq.

The quarantine order does not prohibit a fairgrounds from leasing the facilities for a private poultry show. Although this is not prohibited by the order, it is discouraged, especially in poultry-dense areas such as Lancaster, Lebanon, Chester, and Adams, York, Lehigh, Berks, Snyder, Northumberland, Juniata, and Union counties, or in any location near a commercial poultry facility. If avian influenza was identified in a bird that was at one of these private shows, the tracebacks would be extensive and could result in many flocks being quarantined and possibly infected. The fairgrounds would also have to be quarantined pending virus elimination on the grounds. For private events that do not meet the definition of "Animal Exhibition" under the Animal Exhibition Sanitation Act, pre-entry testing for avian influenza, continuous health monitoring of the birds, and stringent biosecurity protocols are recommended. Records of entries should be retained for two years and made available to the Department upon request if needed for traceability.

No poultry exhibitions regardless of their funding, association, or venue may occur within a 10 km control zone of a premises infected with Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza pursuant to Pa. B. 2597 General Quarantine Order, Virus Control for Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza Poultry, Poultry

Litter, Conveyances, Feed, Refuse, Containers, and Material Standards, published Saturday April 30th, 2022. Current control zone proximity may be checked at the Department's Control Zone Address Checker on the Pennsylvania Animal Diagnostic Laboratory System (PADLS) website by clicking on the following link: Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (arcgis.com) or by typing directly in the search bar:

3. Changes for poultry and poultry products in 2024: These 2024 Animal Health
Requirements and Recommendations for Animal Exhibition, Including
Commercial

Exhibition, will reference the April 16, 2022 General Quarantine Order; Cancellation of Exhibition of Poultry and Their Hatching Eggs Due to Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza or its successor Order, which may allow for limited exhibition of poultry and poultry products at venues that receive funding pursuant to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act referenced above, provided that the Department has determined that there are currently no active HPAI control areas or surveillance zones in place in Pennsylvania.

If there are currently no active HPAI control areas or surveillance zones in place in Pennsylvania, the exhibition of market poultry which will be moved directly to slaughter, unfertilized eggs, and ornamental feathers may be allowed, at the Department's discretion. The Department will provide notification to fair managers if any active HPAI control areas or surveillance zones are in place in Pennsylvania at the beginning of the 2024 fair season and will provide updates throughout the season as necessary. The placement of a HPAI control area or surveillance zone in Pennsylvania will result in the immediate reinstatement of the prohibition of exhibition for all poultry and all poultry products.

- 4. Exhibition of arts and crafts using poultry feathers may be allowed at the Department's discretion. The Department will provide notification to fair managers before the 2024 fair season begins and will provide any updates as necessary throughout the season as necessary. Poultry feathers, including shafts and down, may be allowed for arts and crafts at exhibitions if they meet the following requirements:
 - (a) Shall be sourced and packaged in the United States or meet United States
 Department of Agriculture (USDA) import requirements.
 - (b) Shall be washed or steam-treated and dried before packaging.
- 5. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI). This is an official document issued by a federal, state, tribal, or accredited veterinarian certifying that the animals identified on the document have been inspected and were found to satisfy the regulations pertaining to their intended movement—within the same state, between states, or internationally.
 - (a) CVIs are required for all swine, both from out-of-state and from in-state, and out-of-state camelids, cattle, cervids, equines, goats, sheep, and rabbits. For in-state camelids, cattle, cervids, equines, goats, sheep, and rabbits, these guidelines list a CVI as recommended. A CVI serves as verification of animal ID, an attestation of health, an attestation of a Veterinarian-client-patient-relationship (VCPR), and documentation of applicable vaccination and testing.

- (b) The parameters for a CVI are included under the standards for veterinary accreditation, which are set by the USDA and are in the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), which can be referenced at the following link: eCFR: 9 CFR 161.4 --Standards for accredited veterinarian duties.
 - (i) Per the CFR, a veterinarian may write a CVI if they have examined an animal within the last 10 days (unless the veterinarian is doing qualifying regular herd/flock checks; see the CFR for details.)
 - (ii) Per the CFR, once a veterinarian issues a CVI, the CVI expires after 30 days.
 - (iii) A CVI should be written for only one destination. However, multiple CVIs (one for each destination) can be written within 10 days after the inspection/examination of the animals.
 - (iV) CVIs issued by an accredited veterinarian are legal documents and shall only be issued if the animal is not showing clinical evidence compatible with the presence of a communicable disease upon inspection and/or examination.
 - (V) A copy of the CVI is provided to the owner, and the appropriate remaining CVI paper copies, regardless of if they are completed for interstate or intrastate movement, must be submitted to the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture Bureau of Animal Health at 2301 N. Cameron St. Harrisburg, PA 17110. Alternatively, electronic CVIs may be used.
- (C) An accredited veterinarian may not complete a CVI that does not meet USDA standards.
- (d) A Veterinarian-client-patient-relationship (VCPR) form may be used to verify animal ID and provide an attestation of a VCPR. VCPR forms do not have the 30-day expiration that is federally mandated for CVIs.
- (e) All swine for exhibition must be accompanied by a CVI that was issued by a licensed and accredited veterinarian within the 30 days prior to the date of the animal exhibition.
- 6. **Verification of Veterinarian-client-patient-relationship (VCPR)**: The Animal Exhibition Sanitation Law requires attestation that a VCPR exists for **all animals** to be exhibited. This attestation states that the owner or caretaker of the animal has assumed responsibility to consult a veterinarian and has agreed to follow the instructions of the veterinarian in relation to animal diseases and implementing best management practices intended to reduce and prevent disease. This requirement can be fulfilled by any of the following means:
 - (a) A Veterinarian-client-patient-relationship (VCPR) form with a veterinarian's signature (see Subchapter D).
 - (b) A statement for the animal(s) being exhibited with a signature of the owner or caretaker on the fair registration form: "I attest and affirm that a "VCPR" exists with regard to any animals I will be exhibiting." (This statement does not replace the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement or a CVI where required).

- (C) A valid CVI.
- (d) For poultry and poultry products, this requirement may be fulfilled by the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement (see Subchapter D).
- 7. Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement—Poultry: For allowed market poultry, unfertilized eggs, and ornamental feathers being exhibited, a completed Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement must accompany the market birds, eggs, or feathers for entry into the exhibition premises. This is an official form provided by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture.
- 8. Other recommendations for exhibitors: The Department strongly recommends that animals returning home from exhibitions be isolated from other members of the herd or flock for a minimum of three weeks to help prevent the spread of disease and recommends that exhibitors of all animals discuss the health of their animals, including vaccine recommendations and other preventative measures, with a veterinarian on a regular basis. Owners and their veterinarians should carefully check and comply with additional requirements specific to each exhibition prior to the exhibition to ensure eligibility. The Department also encourages livestock and poultry owners to register their premises with the Department so they can be contacted in a disease emergency situation. Call 717-787-4172 to register a premises.
- 9. Reporting of suspected dangerous transmissible diseases: Please call the Department immediately to report any suspicions of diseases such as avian influenza, foot and mouth disease, African swine fever, and other transmissible diseases. The contact number is: 717772-2852, option 1, 24 hours per day, 7 days per week. Reporting of signs and symptoms that are consistent with a dangerous transmissible disease is legally required by the Domestic Animal Law (3 Pa.C.S. § 2327).
- 10. Interstate and intrastate movement of domestic animals: It is illegal, under section 2323 (related to health requirements) of the Domestic Animal Law, to "...knowingly, recklessly or negligently import or bring into this Commonwealth without written permission of the department any domestic animal that is contaminated with a hazardous substance or that is infected with or that has been exposed to any transmissible disease...or bring into this Commonwealth any domestic animal in violation of any of the provisions of [the Domestic Animal Law], an order entered under the authority of [the Domestic Animal Law] or an attendant regulation to prevent the introduction of any transmissible disease...or have in his keeping or possession any domestic animal imported, brought into or transported within this Commonwealth in violation of any of the provisions of [the Domestic Animal Law] or to allow any such domestic animal to come into contact with any other domestic animal." (3 Pa.C.S. § 2323(a) and (b)).
- 11. Biosecurity guidelines: It is recommended that Exhibition Managers follow the Biosecurity Guidelines for Exhibition Managers, included in Subchapter D, and provide exhibitors with a copy of Keeping Your Show Animals Healthy-Biosecurity Guidelines for Exhibitors. included in Subchapter D.

SUBCHAPTER B: ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR THE PENNSYLVANIA FARM SHOW COMPLEX

1. Rabies vaccination requirements: There are rabies vaccination requirements for vaccineeligible animals exhibited at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex ("complex"). For all animal exhibition events held at the complex, animal species for which a rabies vaccine is labeled for use shall be vaccinated prior to exhibition in the complex. All age-eligible animals of those livestock species must be vaccinated according to label directions within the 12 months preceding entry to the event at the complex. For example, feeder/prospect class animals would be required to be vaccinated to be exhibited and return home. For animal species in which there is not a rabies vaccine product labeled for use (e.g., camelids, goats, swine), extra-label use of a vaccine is at the discretion of the exhibitor's veterinarian.

All rabies-vaccinated animals exhibited at the complex must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate consistent with the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians (NASPHV) guidelines, or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI or Veterinarian-client-patient-relationship (VCPR) form. The vaccine product administered, serial number, date of vaccination, and name of the veterinarian who performed the vaccination should be listed with the official ID of the animal(s) or the name(s) and written physical description(s) and on the CVI or VCPR.

2. Identification (ID): There are ID requirements specific to the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex. Cattle, swine, sheep, and goats must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag. The only exception to this will be for cattle who were identified using a 900 series 15-digit ISO-compliant tag placed before January 1, 2015. No other exceptions will be granted. A person exhibiting at the complex shall distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in an animal that is to be exhibited. Questions about ID should be addressed to the Department at 717-8841613.

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ANIMAL EXHIBITION, INCLUDING COMMERCIAL EXHIBITION

Section 1: Pennsylvania Camelids

I. Requirements:

The Department has no specific requirements for Pennsylvania camelids at fairs.

II. Recommendations:

- A current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue) OR a VCPR Form to verify animal ID.
- All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI or VCPR Form.
- 3. Individual official identification (ID) include any of the following:
- (a) A United States Department of Agriculture (USDA)-issued National Uniform Ear tagging System (NUES) tag US.
- (b) A 15-digit Animal Identification Number ear tag starting with "840". (c) An ISO-compliant 15-digit microchip.
- 4. For animals without any of the ID options listed in number 3 above, the animal's name and a description should be included on the CVI or VCPR Form. Description should include the animal's color, sex, breed, and any distinguishing markings. A photo may accompany the CVI or VCPR Form. <u>Section 2: Out of State Camelids</u> I. Requirements:
- 1. A CVI issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.
- 2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to camelids entering Pennsylvania from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor

located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."

- All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
- 4. Individual official identification (ID) include any of the following:
- (a) A United States Department of Agriculture (USDA)-issued National Uniform Ear tagging System (NUES) tag US.
- (b) A 15-digit Animal Identification Number ear tag starting with "840". (c) An ISO-compliant 15-digit microchip.
- 5. Tuberculosis Testing Requirements:
- (a) No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited free by the USDA.
- (b) All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced by the USDA must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and dates of tests must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable). (c) All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited by the USDA must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older are test negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported are also test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable). (d) All camelids shall comply with the Department's "Interstate Order of Quarantine; Tuberculosis Testing Requirements for Importation of Cattle, Bison, Goats or Camelids" [49 Pa.B. 709, Saturday, February 16, 2019).

II. Recommendations:

All out of state camelids must meet all criteria listed above as "requirements". The Department has no additional recommendations to prevent the introduction of contagious disease from out of state camelids.

Section 3: Pennsylvania Cattle

I. Requirements:

- Sexually intact cattle shall be identified by an official ear tag or other unique identification device approved by the Department. Official identification includes any of the following:
 - (a) A USDA issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) tag
 - (b) A 15-digit Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag starting with "840"
- 2. ID requirements specific to the Farm Show Complex:
 - (a) All cattle entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISOcompliant RFID ear tag.
 - (b) The only exception to this will be for cattle who were identified using a 900 series 15digit ISO-compliant tag placed before January 1, 2015. No other exceptions will be granted.
 - (C) A person exhibiting at the complex shall distinguish between 840 tags with <u>RFID</u> capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in an animal that is to be exhibited.
- 2. See rabies vaccination requirements in the General section for animals exhibiting at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex.

II. Recommendations:

- 1. A current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue). A current VCPR Form may also be used to verify animal ID.

 In addition to the identification for sexually intact cattle, steers and spayed heifers should be identified with forms of ID consistent with # 1 in requirements above.
- All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
- 3. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time).
- 4. Rodeo: It is recommended that Pennsylvania-origin rodeo cattle of all ages be negative on an official tuberculin test within 60 days prior to the start of the fair unless they are members of and originate from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd. The cattle can be accompanied by the negative test report, or the tuberculosis test results can be recorded by the veterinarian on a CVI. Section 4: Out of State Cattle I. Requirements:

- A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.
- 2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to cattle entering Pennsylvania from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor were located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
- Federal regulation (USDA) requires individual official animal identification for all cattle
 of any age for exhibition. Acceptable animal identification includes any of the
 following:
 - (a) A USDA issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) tag
 - (b) A 15-digit Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag starting with "840" . (c) Brands registered with a recognized brand inspection authority and accompanied by an official brand inspection certificate, when agreed to by the shipping and receiving

State or Tribal animal health authorities; or

- (d) Tattoos and other identification methods acceptable to a breed association for registration purposes, accompanied by a breed registration certificate, when agreed to by the shipping and receiving State or/Tribal animal health authorities.
- 5. ID requirements specific to the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex: All cattle entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant <u>RFID</u> ear tag. The only exception to this will be for cattle who were identified using a 900 series 15-digit ISOcompliant tag placed before January 1, 2015. No other exceptions will be granted. A person exhibiting at the complex shall distinguish between 840 tags with <u>RFID</u> capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in an animal that is to be exhibited.
- **6.** Tuberculosis testing requirements:
 - (a) No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited free by the USDA.
 - (b) All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced by the USDA must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and dates of tests must be included on the CVI

- or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).
- (C) All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited by the USDA must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older are test negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported are also test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).
- (d) All cattle shall comply with the Department's "Interstate Order of Quarantine; Tuberculosis Testing Requirements for Importation of Cattle, Bison, Goats or Camelids" [49 Pa.B. 709, Saturday, February 16, 2019).
- (e) Special Tuberculosis Test requirement for Rodeo Cattle. All rodeo cattle and bison from out of state shall be negative on an official tuberculosis test within 60 days prior to entering Pennsylvania unless they originate from and are members of an Accredited Tuberculosis-free herd within an accredited Tuberculosis-free state or zone. This requirement for rodeo cattle from out-of-state is in addition to all other requirements listed above for out-of-state cattle.
- 7. Rabies vaccination requirements: See rabies vaccination requirements in the General section for animals exhibiting at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex.

II. Recommendations:

- 1. While tattoos and brands are acceptable, NUES tags or 840 AIN tags are preferred
- 2. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time).

Section 5. Pennsylvania Cervids

Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) program participants and temporary exhibition sites: Contact the Department (717-772-2852 or 717-787-4944) for specific requirements for exhibition of CWDsusceptible cervids to remain in compliance with CWD programs.

I. Requirements:

- Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes any of the following:
 - (a) A legible and unique tattoo approved by the Department or USDA.
 - (b) A USDA-issued ear tag bearing a unique number provided by USDA that utilizes one of the following numbering systems:
 - (i) The National Uniform Ear tagging System (NUES).
 - (ii) The Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag bearing 15 digits starting with

"840".

- (iii) The premises-based numbering system using a Premises Identification Number (PIN) in conjunction with a livestock production numbering system.
- (c) An electronic implant device, such as a microchip that utilizes a nationally unique 15digit animal identification number starting with "840" provided an appropriate reader is immediately available wherever the animal is located.

II. Recommendations:

- A current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue). A current VCPR Form may also be used to verify animal ID.
- All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
- 3. Fair management is requested to provide contact information of owners of all cervids which are exhibited to Jody Boyer at the Department within 7 days of the last day of the exhibition (717-787-4944 or jboyer@pa.gov). <u>Section 6:</u>

Out of State Cervids I. Requirements:

- All CWD-susceptible cervid species (including blacktail deer, elk, moose, mule deer, red deer, reindeer, sika deer, whitetail deer, and hybrids): A written importation permit is required from the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture. Call Jody Boyer at 717-7874944 between 8 AM and 4 PM weekdays. Call for a permit at least 30 days in advance.
- A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. The CVI shall confirm that the cervid originates from a herd that has been classified as "Certified" in a government administered CWD herd certification program with components as determined by 9 CFR Part 55.24.
- 3. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to cervids entering Pennsylvania from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these

cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."

- 4. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
- 5. Two forms of individual ID are required for CWD-susceptible species. One form of identification listed below is required as official animal identification. The second device may be either a second form of official animal identification or a form of individual animal identification which is unique to that animal within the herd, and which is linked to the CWD database. Non CWD-susceptible species require only the official form of identification; a second form is not required. Consultation with the Department on currently acceptable forms of identification is strongly recommended when anticipating importation of cervids. Official ID includes any of the following:
 - (a) A legible and unique tattoo approved by the Department and USDA.
 - (b) A USDA-issued ear tag, bearing a unique number provided by USDA that utilizes one of the following numbering systems:
 - (i) The National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES).
 - (ii) The Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag bearing 15 digits starting with

"840".

- (iii) The premises-based numbering system using a Premises Identification Number (PIN) in conjunction with a livestock production numbering system.
- (C) An electronic implant device, such as a microchip that utilizes a nationally unique 15digit animal identification number starting with "840" provided an appropriate reader is immediately available wherever the animal is located.
- 6. Brucellosis testing requirements:
 - (a) All sexually intact cervids 12 months of age and older are test-eligible.
 - (b) If the animal is from a brucellosis certified-free herd, no further testing is required.

The date of the most recent herd test and test results must be included on the CVI. (c) If the animal is from a brucellosis monitored herd, it must be brucellosis test negative within the 90 days prior to the date of importation. The date of the test and the test results must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by the laboratory test report (a copy of the test report is acceptable). (d) If the animal is from a herd with no brucellosis status, it must be brucellosis test negative within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. The date of the test and the test results must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by the laboratory test report (a copy of the test report is acceptable).

7. Tuberculosis testing requirements:

- (a) Cervids of all ages are test-eligible.
- (b) If the animal is from a tuberculosis accredited herd, no further testing is required.

The date of the most recent herd test and test results must be included on the CVI.

- (C) If the animal is from a tuberculosis monitored or Qualified Herd, it must be tuberculosis test negative within the 90 days prior to the date of importation. The date of the test and test results must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable). (d) If the animal is from a herd with no tuberculosis status, it must be test negative on two consecutive tuberculosis tests conducted at least 90 days apart, with the last test conducted within the 90 days prior to the date of importation. The date of the tests and test results must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by the negative test reports (copies of the test reports are acceptable).
- **II. Recommendations:** Fair management is requested to provide contact information of owners of all cervids which are exhibited to Jody Boyer at the Department within 7 days of the last day of the exhibition (717-787-4944 or jboyer@pa.gov).

Section 7: Pennsylvania Dogs

Requirements: Proof of a current rabies vaccination is required for all exhibition dogs 12 weeks of age and older. All rabies-vaccinated dogs shall be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate consistent with the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians (NASPHV) guidelines. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

II. Recommendations:

- 1. All animals are free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases.
- Identification, including a collar with a name plate bearing the name and address of the owner, and a microchip. <u>Section 8: Out of State Dogs</u> I. Requirements:
 - Proof of a current rabies vaccination is required for all exhibition dogs 12 weeks of age and older. All rabies-vaccinated dogs shall be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate consistent with the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians (NASPHV) guidelines.
 - A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) written within the 30 days prior to importation. Exemption: A person may bring one or more dogs into Pennsylvania for show or other demonstration without a CVI for a period not to exceed 30 days provided that each dog is equipped with a collar bearing a name plate giving the name and address of the owner.
 - Not Acceptable: The APHIS Form 7001, U.S. Interstate and International Certificate of Health Examination for Small Animals, is not accepted as a valid CVI.

II. Recommendations:

- 1. All animals are free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases.
- Identification, including a collar with a name plate bearing the name and address of the owner, and a microchip.

Section 9:

Pennsylvania Equine

Animals I.

Requirements:

- The Department of Agriculture has no specific requirements for Pennsylvania equines at fairs. However, fair management has the authority to impose requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.
- See rabies vaccination requirements in the General section for animals exhibiting at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex.

II. Recommendations:

- A current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue). A current VCPR Form may also be used to verify animal ID.
- All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
- 3. It is recommended that all equine animals be test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results should accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection and EIA test results. Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a test-negative dam are exempt from EIA testing recommendations. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
- 4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older. The name of the product used, date of administration and veterinarian administering the rabies vaccination should appear on the CVI or on a rabies vaccination certificate and this information should correlate to a written description of the horse, and any and all forms of identification associated with the horse, such as tattoos, brands, or microchips.
- 5. Permanent identification, including a microchip, tattoo, or brand. **Section 10: Out**

of State Equine Animals I. Requirements:

 A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. Please Note: Extended Equine Certificates of Veterinary Inspection and Interstate Equine Event Permits will not be accepted. Brand Certificates will not be accepted as Certificates of Veterinary Inspection.

- Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) statement: This applies to horses entering Pennsylvania from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
- 4. All equine animals must be test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) by an official test within the 12 months prior to the date of importation. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection and EIA test results. Foals under six months of age accompanied by a dam with negative EIA official test results are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
- 5. If an equine animal has resided in Texas or New Mexico for a cumulative total of 30 days or more within the six months preceding the date of entry into the Commonwealth, that animal must be test-negative for Babesia caballi and Theilleria equi on a competitive enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay (c-ELISA) test, or a Department-approved equivalent test, with the test occurring within the 30 days preceding entry into Pennsylvania. The date of test and the test results shall be written on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- 6. See rabies vaccination requirements in the General section for animals exhibiting at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex.

II. Recommendations:

- 1. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older. The name of the product used, date of administration and veterinarian administering the rabies vaccination should appear on the CVI or on a rabies vaccination certificate and this information should correlate to a written description of the horse, and any and all forms of identification associated with the horse- such as tattoos, brands, or microchips.
 - 2. Permanent identification, including a microchip, tattoo, or brand.

Section 11: Pennsylvania Goats I. Requirements:

- Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Identification used for goats must be permanently affixed to the individual animal. Official ID includes any of the following:
- (a) A USDA ear tag with a US shield US; which includes scrapie program tags (animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags labelled "meat" with a US shield US are not permitted to be exhibited in Pennsylvania. Please call the Department at 717-772-2852 if such a tag is encountered).
- (b) A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear—state postal code and letters/numbers—and individual animal ID in the left ear).
- (C) A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.
- 2. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:
- (a) Market goats must be documented on sales slips which contain all of the following information:
 - (i) Official identification (as described above)
 - (ii) Sale date
 - (iii) Sale location
 - (iv) Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
 - (V) Hauler contact information
 - (Vi) Destination name and contact information
 - (VII) Total number of animals in the shipment
 - (VIII) Type of goat (i.e., meat, dairy, specific breed)
 - (ix) Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler
- (b) Sales slips, or a document containing all of the information required under subsection (a) above, must follow the goats to their final destination (including slaughter facilities).
- (C) Goats which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a valid Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
- (d) A copy of the sale records slips as delineated above and a copy of any CVI, required under subsection (c) above, must be kept by the sale organizer for 5 years.
- 3. ID requirements specific to the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex (Complex):
- (a) Goats entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant <u>RFID</u> ear tag. This can be in addition to the forms of ID listed above so long as only one 840 ID is used.
- (b) A person exhibiting at the complex shall distinguish between 840 tags with <u>RFID</u> capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in an animal that is to be exhibited.

- 4. All goats shall comply with the Department's regulations regarding the intrastate transportation of goats found at 7 Pa.Code § 3.151).
- All goats shall comply with the Department's "General Quarantine Order; Scrapie" [50 Pa.B. 4751, September 19, 2020].

II. Recommendations:

- A current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue). A current VCPR Form may also be used to verify animal ID.
- All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.

Section 12: Out of State Goats

I. Requirements:

- A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation into Pennsylvania.
- Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
- Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Identification used for sheep and goats must be permanently affixed to the individual animal. Official ID includes any of the following:
- (a) A USDA ear tag with a US shield US; which includes scrapie program tags (animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags labelled "meat" with a US shield US are not permitted to be exhibited in Pennsylvania. Please call the Department at 717-772-2852 if such a tag is encountered).
- (b) A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear state postal code and letters/numbers and individual animal ID in the left ear).
- (C) A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.
- 5. Tuberculosis testing requirements:

- (a) No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited-free by the USDA.
- (b) All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced by the USDA must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).
- (C) All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older have tested negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported have also tested negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).
- (d) All goats shall comply with the Department's "Interstate Order of Quarantine; Tuberculosis Testing Requirements for Importation of Cattle, Bison, Goats or Camelids" [49 Pa.B. 709, Saturday, February 16, 2019).
- **6.** For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:
- (a) Market goats must be documented on sales slips which contain all the following information:
 - (i) Official identification (as described above)
 - (ii) Sale date
 - (iii) Sale location
 - (iv) Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
 - (V) Hauler contact information
 - (VI) Destination name and contact information
 - (VII)Total number of animals in the shipment
 - (VIII) Type of goat (i.e., meat, dairy, specific breed)
 - (ix) Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler
- (b) Sales slips, or a document containing all of the information required under subsection (a) above, must follow the goats to their final destination (including slaughter facilities).
- (C) Goats which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a valid Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
- (d) A copy of the sale records slips as delineated above and a copy of any CVI, required under subsection (c) above, must be kept by the sale organizer for 5 years.
- 7. ID requirements specific to the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex (Complex):
- (a) Goats entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant <u>RFID</u> ear tag. This can be in addition to the forms of ID listed above so long as only one 840 ID is used.
- (b) A person exhibiting at the complex shall distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in an animal that is to be exhibited.

- 8. All goats shall comply with the Department's regulations regarding the importation of goats found at 7 Pa.Code §§ 3.21-3.23 and 3.25-3.28).
- All goats shall comply with the Department's "Interstate/International Quarantine Order; Scrapie" [50 Pa.B. 4754, September 19, 2020].

II. Recommendations:

All out of state goats must meet all criteria listed above as "requirements". The Department has no additional recommendations to prevent the introduction of contagious disease from out of state goats.

Section 13: Pennsylvania Poultry, Unfertilized Eggs, and Ornamental

Feathers I. Definitions:

Poultry. The term includes all domesticated fowl, including chickens, turkeys, ostriches, emus, rheas, cassowaries, waterfowl, and game birds (pheasants, partridge, quail, grouse, and guineas); but excludes doves, pigeons, psittacine and passerine birds.

Poultry products. The term shall mean products of or made from poultry, including eggs, poultry parts or any goods or items containing poultry or made or derived from poultry, such as but not limited to, feathers including ornamental feathers and feathers used for arts and crafts, beaks, feet, down, or poultry parts.

II. Requirements:

- Changes for exhibition of poultry and poultry products in 2024 if the Department has
 determined that there are currently no active HPAI control areas or surveillance
 zones in place in Pennsylvania, and at the Department's discretion:
 - (a) The 2024 Animal Health Requirements and Recommendations for Animal Exhibition,

Including Commercial Exhibition, will reference the April 16, 2022 General Quarantine

Order; Cancellation of Exhibition of Poultry and Their Hatching Eggs Due to Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza *or its successor Order*, which may allow for limited exhibition of poultry and poultry products at venues that receive funding pursuant to the

Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act referenced above, if the Department has determined that there are currently no active HPAI control areas or surveillance zones in place in Pennsylvania.

(b) If the Department has determined that there are currently no active HPAI control areas or surveillance zones in place in Pennsylvania, the exhibition of market poultry which will be moved directly to slaughter, unfertilized eggs, and ornamental feathers may be allowed, at the Department's discretion. The Department will provide notification to fair managers if any active HPAI control areas or surveillance zones are in place in Pennsylvania at the beginning of the 2024 fair season and will provide updates throughout the season as necessary. The placement of a HPAI control area or surveillance zone in Pennsylvania will result in the immediate reinstatement of the prohibition of exhibition for all poultry and all poultry products.

- 2. No poultry exhibitions regardless of their funding, association, or venue may occur within a 10 km control area of a premises infected with Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (see Subchapter A. General Information Section, Paragraphs 2, 3, and 4). Poultry exhibitions may occur at venues or locations that are not within a current control area and do not receive funding pursuant to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act 3 P.S. § 1501 et seq. so long as the following requirements are met. Current Control area proximity may be checked at the Department's Control Zone Address Checker on the PADLS website by clicking on the following link: Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (arcgis.com) or by typing directly in the search bar: https://padeptag.maps.arcgis.com/apps/webappviewer/index.html?id=a9066a3d68a 443a 08043766cb84bf4ae.
- 3. General Requirements for Poultry and Poultry Products: Pennsylvania Poultry and Poultry Products shall meet all applicable regulations and requirements, including those set forth in Subchapter D. (relating to Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture Regulation and Quarantine Order Requirements), Section A (relating to animals for exhibition) and Section H. (relating to Poultry, Birds, Water and Game Fowl and their Hatching Eggs), and all testing and other requirements related to pullorum/typhoid.

4. Requirements for Exhibition of Ornamental Feathers:

- (a) Shall be sourced in the United States.
- (b) Ornamental feathers sourced from poultry to be entered into a competition or used to produce jewelry or other items to be exhibited or sold shall be free of visible manure, litter, or other debris.
- (C) Transport container shall have been cleaned and disinfected before being used to transport feathers to the exhibition.
- (d) An Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) shall accompany the feathers. If a CVI is used, endorsement of biosecurity on the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement shall also accompany the feathers.
- (e) Ornamental feathers to be entered into a competition or used to produce jewelry or other items to be exhibited or sold shall originate from a flock which is not known to be infected with avian influenza. This requirement can be met by using one of the following methods:
 - (i) Ornamental feathers sourced from poultry shall originate from flock which has had a negative AI test (see testing requirements for poultry in Subsection 7 of this Section 13 below) within 14 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. (ii) The feathers shall be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable).
 - (iii) Ornamental feathers sourced from poultry to be entered into a competition or used to produce jewelry or other items to be exhibited or sold shall be clean and held in a clean area separate from poultry or other poultry products for at least 120 days at a minimum of 68 degrees Fahrenheit before exhibition. The date the feathers were moved to a holding area, along with the holding temperature, shall be included on the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI). If a CVI is used, endorsement of biosecurity on the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement shall also accompany the feathers.

5. Requirements for Exhibition of Unfertilized Poultry Eggs:

- (a) Eggs shall be washed and sanitized in a 100-200 ppm chlorine solution or other disinfectant that is approved by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), which is effective in destroying influenza virus, and dried before being placed in a carton.
- (b) Eggs shall be packaged in a new cardboard or Styrofoam carton or in a plastic carton which was cleaned, disinfected, and dried, for entry into an event. (c) An Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) shall accompany the eggs. If a CVI is used, endorsement of biosecurity on the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement shall also accompany the eggs.
 - (d) The eggs shall originate from a flock which had a negative AI test (see testing requirements for poultry in Subsection 7 of this Section 13 below) within 14 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition.
 - (e) The eggs shall be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable).
 - (f) If any eggs hatch at the exhibition, the hatchlings shall be removed immediately and returned to the farm of origin.

6. Requirements for Exhibition of Market Poultry:

- (a) All Pennsylvania poultry entering an exhibition must bear an official Department issued leg band. Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader).
- (b) Poultry may be exhibited only if they will be moved immediately after judging directly from the fair/show grounds to a facility for slaughter. All poultry exhibited in Pennsylvania at Department sponsored or funded exhibitions shall move as all-in and all-out directly to a Department or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment.
- (C) Arrival, exhibition, and departure of the poultry shall occur within a 72 hour window. The 72 hours begin when the first poultry arrive on the show grounds, whether unloaded or not, and ends when the last poultry physically leave the premises in a vehicle. (d) Waterfowl for exhibit shall be kept separate and apart from other poultry in a biosecure manner.
- (e) An Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) shall accompany the poultry. If a CVI is used, endorsement of biosecurity on the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement shall also accompany the poultry.
- (f) All poultry on the show grounds shall be monitored for signs of illness, and any signs of illness shall be reported to the Department immediately (717-772-2852).
- (g) All poultry on the show grounds shall be displayed behind barriers such as ropes to prevent public access to the poultry, with signage to prevent the public from crossing the barrier.
- (h) Conveyances shall be cleaned and disinfected before loading to transport poultry to the show, and after returning to the premises of origin.

7. Avian Influenza Testing and Verification:

(a) All samples shall be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian and shall be tested in a National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) laboratory.

- (b) All poultry for exhibition shall originate from a flock in which a random, representative sample of a minimum of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested for avian influenza within the 14 days prior to opening date of the exhibition.
 - (c) For waterfowl, cloacal swab samples shall be collected for testing. Swabs from geese and ducks may not be combined in the same tube for testing.
 - (d) For chickens, turkeys, game birds, and ratites, blood samples (AGID testing) or tracheal or oropharyngeal swab samples (PCR testing) are acceptable samples.

Samples from more than one species may not be combined in the same tube for testing.

(e) The poultry shall be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable).

Test results shall be negative.

- (f) If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds of age.
- (g) Untested birds shall not be comingled with or added to the tested flock after negative samples have been collected and before the show.
- (h) Sample collectors and testers must maintain records of animal identification, testing records, and any other records required by the Domestic Animal Law and any order issued by the Department for a minimum of two years and must make records available to the Department upon request.
- National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) protocols for sample collection, including the number of swabs/tubes of viral transport media, and testing shall be followed. All samples must be tested at a NAHLN laboratory.

<u>Section 14: Out of State Poultry, Unfertilized Eggs, and Ornamental</u> Feathers

Definitions:

Poultry. The term includes all domesticated fowl, including chickens, turkeys, ostriches, emus, rheas, cassowaries, waterfowl, and game birds (pheasants, partridge, quail, grouse, and guineas); but excludes doves, pigeons, psittacine and passerine birds.

Poultry products. The term shall mean products of or made from poultry, including eggs, poultry parts or any goods or items containing poultry or made or derived from poultry, such as but not limited to, feathers including ornamental feathers and feathers used for arts and crafts, beaks, feet, down, or poultry parts.

II. Requirements:

- Changes for poultry and poultry products in 2024 if the Department has determined that there are currently no active HPAI control areas or surveillance zones in place in Pennsylvania and at the Department's discretion:
 - (a) The 2024 Animal Health Requirements and Recommendations for Animal Exhibition,

Including Commercial Exhibition, will reference the April 16, 2022 General Quarantine

Order; Cancellation of Exhibition of Poultry and Their Hatching Eggs Due to Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza *or its successor Order*, which may allow for limited exhibition of poultry and poultry products at venues that receive funding pursuant to the

Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act referenced above, if the Department has

determined that there are currently no active HPAI control areas or surveillance zones in place in Pennsylvania.

- (b) If the Department has determined that there are currently no active HPAI control areas or surveillance zones in place in Pennsylvania the exhibition of market poultry which will be moved directly to slaughter, unfertilized eggs, and ornamental feathers may be allowed, at the Department's discretion. The Department will provide notification to fair managers if any active HPAI control areas or surveillance zones are in place in Pennsylvania at the beginning of the 2024 fair season and will provide updates throughout the season as necessary. The placement of a HPAI control area or surveillance zone in Pennsylvania flock will reinstitute the prohibition for all poultry and poultry products in Pennsylvania.
- 2. Out of State Poultry, Unfertilized Eggs and Ornamental Feathers shall meet the standards established in and comply with all the requirements set forth in Section 13 (relating to Pennsylvania Poultry, Unfertilized Eggs and Ornamental Feathers) subsections 2. (relating to control area requirements), 4. (relating to requirements for exhibition of ornamental feathers), 5. (relating to requirements for exhibition of unfertilized poultry eggs), 6. (relating to requirements for exhibition of market poultry), and 7. (relating to avian influenza testing and verification).
- 3. Out of State Poultry and Poultry Products shall meet all Federal and Pennsylvania import and interstate transportation regulations, including those set forth in Subchapter D. (relating to Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture Regulation and Quarantine Order Requirements), Section A. (relating to animals for exhibition and Section H. (relating to Poultry, Birds, Water and Game Fowl and their Hatching Eggs), and all testing and other requirements related to pullorum/typhoid. Section 15: Pennsylvania Rabbits I. Requirements:
- The Department of Agriculture has no specific requirements for Pennsylvania rabbits at fairs. However, fair management has the authority to impose requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.
- The owner of the animal and the place of exhibition or destination shall meet the standards established at sections 2323 and 2327 of the Domestic Animal Law (3 Pa.C.S. §§ 2323 and 2327) and set forth in Subchapter A, paragraphs 9 and 10 of this document.
- 3. The owner of the animal shall meet all general requirements for importation and intrastate movement as set forth in sections 3.3, 3.4, 3.5,3.6 and 3.7 of the Department's regulations (7 Pa.Code §§ 3.3-3.7).
- 4. While on exhibit or at any time following exhibition, it is an obligation to report all mass mortality events and all rabbits who are ill and bleeding from eyes, nose, mouth, or have bloody stools to the Department's emergency line 717-772-2852, option 1. It is vital to quickly identify and prevent dangerous transmissible diseases such as Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHD) from spreading.

II. Recommendations:

- A current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue). The CVI shall be written by an accredited veterinarian and shall contain the following statements:
 - "All Rabbits in the shipment have been examined for and found free of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases including RHD and there have not been multiple mortality events or rabbits exhibiting hemorrhages within the last 90 days. The rabbits in this shipment have not been housed or exhibited with any rabbits associated with known mass mortality or hemorrhage events."
 - "In the last 90 days, the rabbits in this shipment, have not been exhibited in, housed in, or traveled to, any state or territory in which RHD has been diagnosed within the last 12 months. In addition, during the last 90 days, they have had no contact with any captive or wild rabbit which originated from or travelled to one of those affected states or territories."
- Vaccination against RHDV-2: Vaccination of Pennsylvania origin rabbits against RHDV-2 is encouraged.

Section 16: Out of State Rabbits

I. Requirements:

- Interstate and International Order of Quarantine: The owner and the exhibition or destination shall comply with the requirements of the Department's quarantine order, "Interstate/International Quarantine Order; Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease [50 Pa.B. 5272, Saturday, September 26, 2020].
- 2. Rabbits originating from a Commonwealth, State, Territory or Country identified as being affected by RHD within the 12 months prior to the start of the exhibition: No rabbits or their products, such as meat, pelts, hides, carcasses or other items, and no equipment, exposed feed, forages, or conveyances or other items or associated materials may enter the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania from a Commonwealth, State, Territory, or Country where RHD has been diagnosed in the prior twelve (12) months or there is a reasonable suspicion it exists unless they meet the following requirements:
 - (a) All live rabbits must be accompanied by a CVI and must be examined by an accredited veterinarian within the seventy-two (72) hours prior to the date of shipment to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The CVI must include statements by an accredited veterinarian certifying that:
 - (i) All rabbits in the shipment have been examined for and found free of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases;
 - (ii) All rabbits have originated from a single premises that has no signs of infectious, contagious or communicable disease in rabbits;
 - (iii) There have been no movements of rabbits onto the premises of origin within the 90 days prior to the date of shipment; and
 - (iV) The rabbits have had no contact with wild or captive rabbits other than their cohorts in the 90 days prior to the date of shipment.
 - (b) No rabbits or their products, such as meat, pelts, hides, carcasses or other items, and no equipment, exposed feed or conveyances or other items or associated materials may enter the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania from a premises exposed to, contaminated with or known to be affected with RHD, or

where there is a reasonable suspicion the disease exists or the rabbits have been exposed to or infected with RHD.

II. Recommendations:

- For all rabbits: Vaccination against RHDV-2 is encouraged. PLEASE NOTE:
 Vaccination of rabbits does not exempt the rabbit, rabbit products, or equipment
 used for them, from meeting the import requirements set forth in the Department's
 "Interstate/International Quarantine Order; Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease [50 Pa.B.
 5272, Saturday, September 26, 2020] and listed in subsections I. 1. and 2. (relating
 to requirements) above.
- 2. For rabbits that originate from a Commonwealth, State, Territory, or Country where RHD has NOT been diagnosed in the prior twelve (12) months or there is NO reasonable suspicion it exists: A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue) shall be issued and shall include statements by an accredited veterinarian certifying that:

"All rabbits in the shipment have been examined for and found free of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases including RHD and there have not been multiple mortality events or rabbits exhibiting hemorrhages within the last 90 days. The rabbits in this shipment have not been housed or exhibited with any rabbits associated with known mass mortality or hemorrhage events."

"In the last 90 days, the rabbits in this shipment, have not been exhibited in, housed in, or traveled to, any state or territory in which RHD has been diagnosed within the last 12 months. In addition, during the last 90 days, they have had no contact with any captive or wild rabbit originating from or travelled to one of those affected states or territories." Section 17: Pennsylvania Sheep I. Requirements:

- Individual official animal identification is required for all sheep. Identification used for sheep must be permanently affixed to the individual animal. Official ID includes any of the following:
 - (a) A USDA ear tag with a US shield (us); which includes scrapie program tags (animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags labelled (meat" with a US shield (us) are not permitted to be exhibited in Pennsylvania. Please call the Department at 717-772-2852 if such a tag is encountered).
 - (b) A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear—state postal code and letters/numbers—and individual animal ID in the left ear).
 - (C) A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.
- 2. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:
 - (a) Market sheep must be documented on sales slips which contain all of the following information:
 - (i) Official identification (as described above)
 - (ii) Sale date
 - (iii) Sale location
 - (iv) Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor

- (V) Hauler contact information
- (VI) Destination name and contact information
- (Vii) Total number of animals in the shipment
- (VIII) Type of sheep (i.e., meat, dairy, specific breed)
- (ix) Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler
- (b) Sales slips, or a document containing all of the information required under subsection (a) above, must follow the sheep to their final destination (including slaughter facilities).
- (C) Sheep which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a valid Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
- (d) A copy of the sale records slips as delineated above and a copy of any CVI, required under subsection (c) above, must be kept by the sale organizer for 5 years.
- 3. ID requirements specific to the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex (Complex):
 - (a) Sheep entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag. This can be in addition to the forms of ID listed above so long as only one 840 ID is used.
 - (b) A person exhibiting at the complex shall distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in an animal that is to be exhibited.
- 4. See rabies vaccination requirements for exhibition of sheep at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex in the general section.
- All sheep shall comply with the Department's regulations regarding the intrastate transportation of sheep found at 7 Pa.Code §§ 3.161-3.163).
- All sheep shall comply with the Department's "General Quarantine Order; Scrapie" [50 Pa.B. 4751, September 19, 2020].

II. Recommendations:

- A current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) (valid for 30 days after the date of issue). A current VCPR Form may also be used to verify animal ID.
- All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
- A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3
 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time). <u>Section</u>

18: Out of State Sheep I. Requirements:

 A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to entry into Pennsylvania.

- Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) Statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past
 - $90\ days,$ these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- 3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
- Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required. Identification used for sheep must be permanently affixed to the individual animal. Official scrapie ID includes any of the following:
- (a) A USDA ear tag with a US shield (is); which includes scrapie program tags (animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags labelled "meat" with a US shield (is) are not permitted to be exhibited in Pennsylvania. Please call the Department at 717-772-2852 if such a tag is encountered).
- (b) A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear state postal code and letters/numbers and individual animal ID in the left ear).
- (C) A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.
- 5. ID requirements specific to the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex (Complex):
- (a) Sheep entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant <u>RFID</u> ear tag. This can be in addition to the forms of ID listed above so long as only one 840 ID is used.
- (b) A person exhibiting at the complex shall distinguish between 840 tags with <u>RFID</u> capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in an animal that is to be exhibited
- 6. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:
- (a) Market sheep must be documented on sales slips which contain all the following information:
 - (i) Official identification (as described above)
 - (ii) Sale date
 - (iii) Sale location
 - (iv) Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
 - (V) Hauler contact information
 - (VI) Destination name and contact information
 - (Vii) Total number of animals in the shipment
 - (VIII) Type of sheep (i.e., meat, dairy, specific breed)
 - (ix) Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler

- (b) Sales slips, or a document containing all of the information required under subsection (a) above, must follow the sheep to their final destination (including slaughter facilities).
- (C) Sheep which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a valid Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
- (d) A copy of the sale records slips as delineated above and a copy of any CVI, required under subsection (c) above, must be kept by the sale organizer for 5 years.
- See rabies vaccination requirements for exhibition of sheep at the Farm Show Complex in the general section.
- 8. All sheep shall comply with the Department's regulations regarding the importation of sheep found at 7 Pa.Code §§ 3.121-3.123.
- All sheep shall comply with the Department's "Interstate/International Quarantine Order; Scrapie" [50 Pa.B. 4754, September 19, 2020].

II. Recommendations:

A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time).

Section 19: Pennsylvania Swine

Requirements:

- No swine species shall be exhibited in Pennsylvania unless each animal is in compliance with all of the following:
 - (a) Is accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of the exhibition.
 - (b) Is permanently identified by an official 840 series <u>RFID</u> ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI.
 - (C) Has been visually inspected and found to be free of signs of contagious disease immediately prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian or swine health monitor appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee.
 - (d) Is inspected by a certified swine health monitor appointed by the fair or show/event organizers.
 - (i) Swine health monitors must undergo annual online training which can be found at the following link: <u>Pennsylvania Show and Fair Swine Health Monitor</u> <u>Training (psu.edu)</u> or the following site Extension.psu.edu/Pennsylvania-showand-fair-swinehealth-monitor-training.
 - (ii) Swine health monitors must provide a current completion certificate to the fair or show staff they will be performing monitoring services for, prior to the start of the event.
- All breeding swine exhibitions must occur prior to the arrival of any market swine. All the following conditions apply:
 - (a) Castrated swine shall not be classified as breeding swine.

- (b) Breeding swine shall be removed from the animal exhibition premises prior to any market swine arriving.
- (C) Breeding swine for exhibitions shall arrive, exhibit, and depart in a period no greater than 72 hours. Time begins when the first swine arrives physically on the fairgrounds whether unloaded from a trailer or not and ends when the last hog physically leaves the premises on a trailer.
- (d) Swine birthing exhibitions and educational displays in which swine are not competing may occur concurrently with market swine animal exhibition, as long as reasonable precaution is made to ensure the biosecurity of the swine birthing exhibition or educational display. Consult your Department regional veterinarian or your herd veterinarian for biosecurity advice.
- 3. All market swine exhibited in Department sponsored or funded market shows shall move as all-in and all-out directly to a Department or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter-only sales.
- 4. Shows that are not sponsored by or that do not receive funding from the Department, including jackpot shows and 4-H roundups, not occurring during a Department sponsored or funded fair or show are exempt from the terminal slaughter requirement only if the following conditions are adhered to:
 - (a) As is stated above, the swine shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within the 30 days prior to the date of the exhibition and shall be permanently identified by an 840 series <u>RFID</u> identification ear tag.
 - (b) Arrival, exhibition and departure of the swine shall occur within a 72-hour window. Time begins when the first swine arrives physically on the exhibition grounds, whether unloaded from a trailer or not, and ends when the last hog physically leaves the premises on a trailer.
 - (C) There shall be no public access to the animals other than observation during competitions.
 - (d) An accredited veterinarian or trained swine health monitor shall have visually inspected the animals prior to unloading and found each animal to be free of signs of contagious disease.
 - (e) An accredited veterinarian or trained swine health monitor shall monitor and record the health of the pigs daily for signs of contagious disease, and the accredited veterinarian shall immediately report suspicion of disease to the State Animal Health

Official.

- (f) A Veterinary-client-patient-relationship is established between the show committee/management staff and an accredited veterinarian, and that veterinarian is readily available for health monitoring, emergency coverage, treatment, follow up evaluation, and prompt reporting of suspicion of disease to the State Animal Health Official
- The swine shall be in compliance with the Department's regulations regarding health requirements and intrastate transportation of swine found a 7 Pa.Code §§ 3.172-3.180.
- The swine shall comply with the Department's general quarantine orders; "General Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements" [51 Pa.B. 3861, Saturday, July

17, 2021], "Addendum to the General Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements" [52 Pa.B. 2362, April 23, 2022] and "Interstate/International and General Quarantine Order; Importation and Intrastate Movement of Swine" [39 Pa.B. 5442, September 19, 2009].

Section 20: Out of State Swine

Requirements:

- A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of the exhibition is required. The CVI shall include a statement verifying that the swine have not been fed raw garbage.
- Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) Statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases, an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
- 4. The swine shall comply with all the provisions of subsections 1. through 4. of Section 19 (relating to Pennsylvania Swine Requirements) above.
- 5. Individual animal ID must be permanently identified by an official 840 series RFID ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI.
- 6. Brucellosis Testing Requirements: No Brucellosis test is required if the animal originates from a validated brucellosis-free herd within a Brucellosis free state. All others must be tested negative within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. The date of test and test results must be included on the CVI.
- 7. Pseudorabies Testing Requirements: No Pseudorabies test is required if the animal originates from a Qualified Pseudorabies-free herd within a Pseudorabies free state. All others must be tested negative within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. The date of test and test results must be included on the CVI.
- All breeding swine exhibitions must occur prior to the arrival of any market swine. All the following conditions apply:
 - (a) Castrated swine shall not be classified as breeding swine.
 - (b) Breeding swine shall be removed from the animal exhibition premises prior to any market swine arriving.
 - (C) Breeding swine for exhibitions shall arrive, exhibit, and depart in a period no greater than 72 hours. Time begins when the first swine arrives physically on the fairgrounds whether unloaded from a trailer or not and ends when the last hog physically leaves the premises on a trailer.

- (d) Swine birthing exhibitions and educational displays in which swine are not competing may occur concurrently with market swine animal exhibition, as long as reasonable precaution is made to ensure the biosecurity of the swine birthing exhibition or educational display. Consult your Department regional veterinarian or your herd veterinarian for biosecurity advice.
- 9. All market swine exhibited in Department sponsored or funded market shows shall move on an all-in all-out basis directly to a Department or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter-only sales.
- 10. Shows that are not sponsored by or that do not receive funding from the Department, including jackpot shows and 4-H roundups, not occurring during a Department sponsored or funded fair or show are exempt from the terminal slaughter requirement only if the following conditions are adhered to:
- (a) As is stated above, the swine shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within the 30 days prior to the date of the exhibition and shall be permanently identified by an 840 series <u>RFID</u> identification ear tag.
- (b) Arrival, exhibition and departure of the swine shall occur within a 72-hour window. Time begins when the first swine arrives physically on the exhibition grounds, whether unloaded from a trailer or not, and ends when the last hog physically leaves the premises on a trailer.
- (C) There shall be no public access to the animals other than observation during competitions.
- (d) An accredited veterinarian or trained swine health monitor shall have visually inspected the animals prior to unloading and found each animal to be free of signs of contagious disease.
- (e) An accredited veterinarian or trained swine health monitor shall monitor and record the health of the pigs daily for signs of contagious disease, and the accredited veterinarian shall immediately report suspicion of disease to the State Animal Health Official.
- (f) A Veterinary-client-patient-relationship is established between the show committee/management staff and an accredited veterinarian, and that veterinarian is readily available for health monitoring, emergency coverage, treatment, follow up evaluation, and prompt reporting of suspicion of disease to the State Animal Health Official.
- 11. The swine shall comply with the Department's regulations regarding interstate transportation and importation of swine found a 7 Pa.Code §§ 3.131-3.139.
- 12. The swine shall comply with the Department's interstate and international quarantine orders; "Interstate and International Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements" [51 Pa.B. 3864, Saturday, July 17, 2021], "Addendum to the Interstate and International
 - Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements" [52 Pa.B. 2363, April 23, 2022] and "Interstate/International and General Quarantine Order; Importation and Intrastate Movement of Swine" [39 Pa.B. 5442, September 19, 2009].

- Sheep must also meet the requirements set forth in the Department's quarantine order regarding tuberculosis, "Interstate Order of Quarantine; Tuberculosis Testing Requirements for Importation of Cattle, Bison, Goats or Camelids" [49 Pa.B. 709, February 16, 2019].
- 6. Sheep for exhibition must comply with individual and group identification, flock origin, comingling, transportation, transfer, sale, and recordkeeping requirements established in the Code of Federal Regulations at 9 CFR 79.2 (relating to identification and records requirements for sheep and goats in interstate commerce).
- K. Swine for exhibition in Pennsylvania must meet the requirements of the Department's Quarantine Orders and of the Department's regulations established at Title 7 of the Pennsylvania Code, and listed below:
 - Sections 3.172 3.180 (relating to health requirements, care and handling
 of breeding and feeder swine during transportation and at destination,
 quarantine of swine, areas considered contaminated, use of loading chutes,
 sanitation of contaminated facilities, records requirements, swine for
 exhibition) establish specific provisions for intrastate transportation of swine
 (7 Pa.Code §§ 3.172- 3.180).
 - Sections 3.131 3.139 (relating to general provisions, swine for slaughter, garbage fed swine, swine interstate commerce, brucellosis requirements, pseudorabies requirements) establish specific provisions for the interstate transportation and importation of swine (7 Pa.Code §§ 3.131-3.139).
 - 3. Swine must comply with the requirements set forth in the Department's "Addendum to the Interstate and International Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements" [52 Pa.B. 2363, April 23, 2022].
 - 4. Swine must comply with the requirements set forth in the Department's "Addendum to the General Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements" [52 Pa.B. 2363, April 23, 2022].
 - Swine must be in compliance with the requirements set forth in the Department's "General Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements" [51 Pa.B 3861, July 17, 2021].
 - 6. Swine must also be in compliance with the requirements set forth in the Department's "Interstate and International Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements" [51 Pa.B., 3864, July 17, 2021].
 - Swine must be in compliance with the requirements set forth in the Department's "Interstate/International and General Quarantine Order; Importation and Intrastate Movement of Swine" [39 Pa.B. 5442, September 19, 2009].

Biosecurity Guidelines for Exhibition Managers

2024

Many diseases of animals can be spread easily through direct contact between animals, through sharing of equipment, and through the air. People can also spread disease on their hands, clothing and footwear. According to the CDC, about 60% of known infectious diseases in people can be spread from animals, about 75% new or emerging infectious diseases in people come from animals.

There are four important goals of an effective biosecurity plan:

- 1. Protect animals from disease,
- 2. Protect exhibitors from disease, and
- 3. Protect the public from disease.
- 4. Allow the show to continue with minimal interruption due to animal disease.

Animal exhibitions/shows can lead to an increased risk of disease spread between animals, for several reasons—animals from multiple places congregate at these locations; animals are often stressed from being transported and from all the unusual sights and sounds at the show; and they may be exposed to animals with inapparent health issues.

For this reason, all show managers and exhibitors should have standard biosecurity protocols in place, to include:

Show Managers- At the Show:

Animals:

- Make arrangements with a veterinarian in advance to oversee animal health for the event, and to be on call to respond to any concerns, including animal health emergencies.
- Ensure the Animal Health requirements are publicized and clearly stated. Requirements should be as stringent as possible.
- Ensure that all animals meet the requirements before entry. Require that animals arrive only during specified check-in times with appropriately trained inspectors there to check paperwork.
- Have appropriately trained inspectors monitor the health of the animals throughout the event (this includes swine health monitors).
- Contact the show veterinarian with any animal health concerns. The Department of Agriculture should be contacted if an inspector or veterinarian suspects a reportable

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- disease. Designated caretakers should be assigned to these animals until it is determined that they may be moved back to the farm of origin.
- Waterfowl for exhibit should be kept separate and apart from other poultry in a biosecure manner.

Animal Barns:

- Clean and disinfect animal buildings and pens, and allow them to dry, before moving animals onto the grounds. Follow label directions and safety instructions for mixing and using disinfectants.
- Manage the number of animals in each pen or coop to avoid overcrowding and overheating.
- Minimize animal stress by ensuring animals are housed so that they have good ventilation and access to fresh, clean water, feed, and bedding.
- Identify an isolation area before animals arrive, and move sick animals to this area as soon as they are identified
- 5. Keep dust to a minimum.
- Maintain rodent and insect control programs in the barns which are safe for exhibitors, visitors, and exhibit animals.
- 7. Manage water run-off and avoid allowing standing water in the barns.

Exhibitors and General Public:

- Encourage exhibitors to practice good biosecurity at the event and when returning home with their animals.
- Provide every exhibitor with a show manager's cell phone number to report concerns throughout the event.
- Maintain handwashing stations and signage (as required by the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, Title 3, Chapter 25) for exhibitors and the public, and encourage frequent handwashing, especially after handling animals and before eating.
- 4. Discourage eating and drinking in the animal areas.
- Discourage the general public and exhibitors from bringing any other animals with the exception of service animals into the exhibition animal areas.

Judging areas:

- 1. Clean and disinfect judging areas, and allow them to dry, before judging begins.
- Remove animal manure between groups and store it properly in the designated manure area.
- 3. Keep dust to a minimum.
- 4. Manage water run-off and avoid having any standing water in the judging area. If using water to control dust, the water applicator, whether it be a water truck, sprinkler, or hose, must be properly adjusted to apply an appropriate amount of water to ensure standing water is not an issue.

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Set up the judging area, including the waiting area, to avoid nose-to-nose contact between animals.

Animal Weight Scales:

1. Clean and disinfect scales used for weighing market animals as needed.

Wash areas:

- Clean and disinfect designated wash areas, and allow them to dry, before the animals
 arrive.
- 2. Maintain sufficient water drainage to avoid having standing water in the wash area.
- Ensure that animal manure is removed promptly and stored properly in the designated manure area.

Unloading areas:

- Clean and disinfect the docks used for unloading, and allow them to dry, before the animals arrive.
- Maintain sufficient water drainage to avoid having standing water in the unloading areas.
- Ensure that animal manure is removed promptly and stored properly in the designated manure area.

Trailers and Trailer Parking areas:

Ensure that animal manure and bedding which falls out of the trailers is removed promptly after unloading and is stored properly in the designated manure area..

Manure Management:

Ensure that animal manure is stored properly in the designated manure area, which is in an area not used by visitors, easily accessible to exhibitors, and in an area with no liquid run-off. Fly and rodent control should be in place.

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Keeping Your Show Animals Healthy-Biosecurity Guidelines for Exhibitors-2024

A show can be stressful for your animals. Transportation, unfamiliar housing, new sources of water, new noises, being around different animals, etc. can all cause stress. Stress causes physical changes in their bodies, and their immune systems can be affected, making them more susceptible to becoming sick and spreading disease to other animals. You need to be proactive to protect your animals. The following guidelines can be used to help you do this.

BEFORE THE SHOW

Keep your animals healthy

- Have your animals checked on at least an annual basis by a veterinarian, and contact your veterinarian anytime you think an animal is acting "off". You know your animals better than anyone else does.
- . Check the animal health requirements and recommendations of the show so you are prepared.
- Follow your veterinarian's recommendations for vaccinations for each animal. Vaccinate far enough in advance so your animals are protected before the show and maintain records of any vaccinations and testing done prior to the show.

Biosecurity is critical:

- Biosecurity is defined as procedures intended to protect animals or people against disease.
- If your animals are showing signs of illness, or have been exposed to sick animals, keep them
 home and call your veterinarian.
- If you raise multiple species of poultry, it is recommended that waterfowl are kept separate and apart from other poultry in a biosecure manner.
- Before the show, make sure the truck and trailer are visibly clean and sanitary.
- Before packing up for the show, make sure your tack box and any stall equipment has been cleaned and disinfected.
- · Take only clean tack to the show.

DURING THE SHOW

- Keep your animals' stalls or pens clean and dry, and dispose of manure in the proper location.
- Monitor your animals closely for any signs of illness and report any concerns to the show manager or veterinarian.
- · Keep your animals cool to avoid overheating.
- Maintain good ventilation in the stall or pen—use fans placed outside of the animals' reach if necessary and if allowed by the show management.
- · Avoid nose-to-nose contact between your animals and other exhibitors' animals.
- Don't share equipment, feed or water buckets, or tack with other exhibitors.
- Don't use shared equipment in a wash area or milking area, and try to keep your animals from touching walls or tie chains that other animals have touched.
- Always keep clean, fresh water available to your animals.
- Keep dust to a minimum.
- Prevent the public and other exhibitors from touching or feeding your animals.
- . Wash or sanitize your hands frequently, to protect your animals and for your own safety.
- · Avoid eating or drinking in the animal area.

AFTER THE SHOW

- Isolate any animals that were at the show from the rest of your animals at home for at least 2 weeks for livestock and 3 weeks for poultry, and watch them carefully for any signs of illness.
- Care for the animals that were at the show after you care for the other animals, and always wear clean
 clothing and shoes or boots to care for the other animals.
- Don't share equipment between the animal groups during the isolation period.

OWNER ENDORSED AVIAN HEALTH CERTIFICATE AND BIOSECURITY STATEMENT 2024

Introduction: Highly pathogenic avian influenza is a fatal and contagious disease of poultry, and has led to the loss of more than 65 million birds in the US since 2022. The virus causing this disease can be spread by infected poultry, on poultry products such as feathers and eggs, on clothing and other formites such as packing materials, and through the air. However, if all protocols for reducing the risk of spreading disease are followed, certain poultry, feathers and eggs may be exhibited, at the Department's discretion.

A completed Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement must accompany all avian species (including poultry), eggs, and feathers to a Pennsylvania exhibition. The certificate must be presented to exhibition management prior to cooping of all avian species or displaying of eggs or feathers. This form must be endorsed with the bird, egg, or feather owner's signature.

Avian. Related to birds.

Poultry. The term "poultry" includes all domesticated fowl, including chickens, turkeys, ostriches, emus, rheas, cassowaries, waterfowl, and game birds (pheasants, partridge, quail, grouse, and guineas); but excludes doves, pigeons, psittacine and passerine birds.

As established in the current Pennsylvania Department of Agiculture Animal Health Requirements and Recommendations for Animal Exhibition, Including Commercial Exhibition, an Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement must accompany avian species and poultry products to all animal exhibitions in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

a. Ornamental Feathers:			

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- (ii) Ornamental feathers sourced from poultry to be entered into a competition or used to produce jewelry or other items to be exhibited/sold shall be free of visible manure, litter, or other debris.
- (iii) Transport container shall have been cleaned and disinfected before being used to transport feathers to the exhibition.
- (iv) An Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) shall accompany the feathers. If a CVI is used, endorsement of biosecurity on the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement shall also accompany the feathers.
- (v) Ornamental feathers to be entered into a competition or used to produce jewelry or other items to be exhibited/sold shall originate from a flock which is not known to be infected with avian influenza. This requirement can be met by using one of the following methods:
 - (aa) Ornamental feathers sourced from poultry shall originate from a flock which had a negative Al test (see testing requirements for poultry below (section c) within the 14 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The feathers shall be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). OR
 - (bb) Ornamental feathers sourced from poultry to be entered into a competition or used to produce jewelry or other items to be exhibited/sold shall be clean, and held in a clean area separate from poultry or other poultry products for at least 120 days at a minimum of 88 degrees Fahrenheit before exhibition. The date the feathers were moved to a holding area, along with the holding temperature, shall be included on the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement.

b. Unfertilized Poultry Eggs for Exhibition:

- (i) Eggs shall be washed and sanitized in a 100-200 ppm chlorine solution or other EPAapproved disinfectant which is effective in destroying influenza virus, and dried before being placed in a carton
- (ii) Eggs shall be packaged in a new cardboard or Styrofoam carton or in a plastic carton which was cleaned, disinfected, and dried, for entry into an event.
- (iii) An Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) shall accompany the eggs. If a CVI is used, endorsement of biosecurity on the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement shall also accompany the eggs.
- (iv) The source flock shall have had a negative AI test (see testing requirements for poultry below (section c) within the 14 days prior to the openting date of the exhibition.

c. Poultry for Exhibition:

- (i) Poultry may be exhibited only if they will be moved immediately after judging directly to a facility for slaughter from the show grounds. All poultry exhibited in Pennsylvania at Department sponsored or funded exhibitions shall move as all-in and all-out directly to a Department or United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter
- (ii) Arrival, exhibition and departure of the poultry shall occur within a 72-hour window. The 72 hours begin when the first poultry arrive on the show grounds, whether unloaded or not, and ends when the last poultry physically leave the premises in a vehicle.
- (iii) All poultry entering a show shall be identified with official Department leg bands.
- (iv) An Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) shall accompany the poultry. If a CVI is used, endorsement of biosecurity on the Owner Endorsed Avian Health Certificate and Biosecurity Statement shall also accompany the poultry.

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- (v) All poultry on the show grounds shall be monitored for signs of illness, and any signs of illness shall be reported to the Department immediately (717-772-2852).
- (vi) All poultry on the show grounds shall be displayed behind barriers such as ropes to prevent public access to the poultry, with signage to prevent the public from crossing the barrier.
 (vii) Conveyances shall be cleaned and disinfected before loading to transport poultry to the show, and after returning to the premises of origin.
- (viii) Avian Influenza Testing and Verification:
 - (aa) All samples shall be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian and shall be tested in a National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) laboratory.
 - (bb) All poultry for exhibition shall originate from a flock in which a random, representative sample of a minimum of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested for avian influenza within the 14 days prior to opening date of the exhibition.
 - (cc) For waterfowl, cloacal swab samples shall be collected for testing. Swabs from geese and ducks may not be combined in the same tube for testing.
 - (dd) For chickens, turkeys, game birds, and ratites, blood samples (AGID testing) or tracheal or oropharyngeal swab samples (PCR testing) are acceptable samples. Samples from more than one species may not be combined in the same tube for testing. (ee) The poultry shall be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results shall be negative.
 - (ff) If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds of age.
 - (gg) Untested birds shall not be comingled with or added to the tested flock after negative samples have been collected and before the show.
- 4. Verification of avian health status: All poultry for exhibition and all source flocks for eggs and feathers being exhibited or displayed are free from evidence of infectious and contagious diseases.
- 5. Verification of biosecurity: Biosecurity measures for all feathers, eggs, and poultry being exhibited or displayed include:
 - (i) A biosecurity plan is followed on the premises where the source flock is located, to include at minimum:
 - (aa) Visitors to bird areas are restricted.
 - (bb) Anyone visiting the poultry area should have clean clothing and should have used hand sanitizer or washed their hands before handling poultry or poultry products. (cc) Designated footwear or footwear that has been cleaned and disinfected is worn in the poultry area. A clear line of separation exists at the entrance to the poultry area.
 - (ii) All feathers and eggs are maintained apart from the poultry flock prior to entry into the exhibition.
 - (iii) All conveyances, including transport vehicles, coops, crates, boxes, and other containers used to transport animals or products to the show are cleaned to be free of visible manure, litter, or other debris
 - (iv) All coops, crates, boxes, and other containers used to transport animals or products to the show shall be disinfected with a product effective against the avian influenza virus and allowed to dry before use
 - (v) All exibitors should follow the biosecurity guidelines: Keeping Your Show Animals Healthy-Guidelines for Exhibitors (11/28/23).

2024 Youth Fair Poster Contest Theme: Connecting Our Communities

The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture will once again conduct a statewide poster contest at the agricultural fairs. Participating fairs will hold their own contest and submit one poster from each age group to the state level for additional judging and cash prizes. Entries must be received by or postmarked on November 1, 2024.

- Only one poster may be submitted per exhibitor, per age group. There
 will be three state competitions: ages 8-11, 12-14, and 15-18.
 Exhibitors must be in one of these age groups as of June 1 of the current
 fair season to qualify.
- 2. The poster size must be either 14 x 22 inches or 14 ½ x 22 inches. Other sizes will not be accepted for judging at the state level.

This year's theme is "Connecting Our Communities" Contestants will be asked to submit artwork that showcases the pride and hard work of farmers from across the state, connecting people from all walks of life for a celebration of the importance of agriculture in our communities. Exhibitors using other themes will be disqualified at the state level.

3. The fair secretary or contest coordinator is responsible for submitting the poster and completing the entry form for each poster with each age group to the Fair Office. Please be sure to provide all the information requested on the entry form; incomplete forms will be returned. The poster and entry form can be given to the Fair Administrator at the PSACF fall zone meetings or mailed to the Fair Fund Office:

- Posters must be packaged flat. Posters rolled or folded will be ineligible for judging. Please, do not mail the posters to the PA Farm Show Complex.
- 5. Posters must be received by, or post marked on November 1, 2024.
- Posters will be evaluated on use of the theme, visual appearance and creativity in relation to the exhibitor's age.
- 7. Premium checks for:

1st place \$100 2nd place \$75

3rd place \$50

These checks will be presented by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture to the top three individuals. Winners will be notified in advance and invited to attend an awards presentation. Participants are required to provide their social security numbers for award disbursements from the PA Department of Agriculture.

All posters will become the property of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture for possible future promotional activities for the Pennsylvania Farm Show and Pennsylvania State Association of County Fairs. Any duplication of posters from previous years will be disqualified. Posters will not be returned via mail. Contestants may arrange to have their entries returned following the PA Farm Show through their individual fairs; however, the posters must be picked up in person at the PSACF Convention or Spring Zone Meetings.
